PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings West Point Inn Family!

I have edited many of these president's reports during my time co-running the newsletter (and even ghost-written a couple), but this is the first time I've authored the report under my own name. I am honored to have been selected by the Board of Directors to be the Association's leader this year and I hope to serve you all well.

Speaking of service, I want to thank my predecessor, Wayne Koide. He is a leader by example, and I aim to fulfil my term much the way he did last year. I will hear all sides of the issues before the Board and strive to reach the decisions that are in the best interest of the Inn and the Association. I will also rely on the guidance and advice presented by the Board. To that end, I want to welcome the two newcomers to the Board, Don Keeley and Jim Parton. I also want to express gratitude to Fran Rondeau and Olene Sparks, who completed their Board terms in January.

Some of the issues facing us this year are related to problems the entire state is facing. The aftermath of the wildfires California suffered the last few years is also affecting the Inn. Unfortunately, correcting and mitigating these concerns will take money. Thankfully, we have a great fundraising campaign for one of our biggest projects being led by Suzie Adams Koide. She and her team have raised over \$5,000 towards our water infrastructure improvements but we still have a ways to go. If you can contribute, it would be greatly appreciated.

Besides money, maintaining our Inn takes volunteers. And those we have in droves! I attended the February work party and was impressed that over 40 people braved the elements to come up and contribute. There were jobs being done by all sorts. From young children organizing the game drawers, to teens helping in the kitchen (do their parents know?), to adults cleaning and repairing things all over and to the super brave few that were out brush clearing in the downpour. Thank you all!

And if you can't make it up to the Inn as often as you would like, but still would like to assist with our organization, many of the committees could use your help. Think what interests you about the Inn and contact the chairs responsible for that area. Almost every segment of our Association could use more help. Consider working with Lin Johanson and Gordy MacDermott on Pancake Breakfasts, or Alison Bricker with the

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Newsletter, or Bonnie Jones and Fran Rondeau with House-keeping. I do want to thank new member Ross Asselstine, who is stepping up to join Urban Carmel with some of the big projects that Buildings & Grounds will be tackling this year. The Inn couldn't run without all our dedicated volunteers and our talented group of Innkeepers. Again, kudos to all!

PERSONNEL REPORT


Lin Johanson & Fran Rondeau

VIEW FROM THE PORCH: Mary Ann and Malcolm Dunlap Marilyn Skaff



Mary Ann and Malcolm Dunlap “stumbled across” the West Point Inn while on a hike in 1995. Malcolm had known Olene Sparks since the late 60’s from skiing at Squaw Valley. It was through this relationship that Malcolm and Mary Ann eventually learned of the Inn. Malcolm credited Olene with “hooking them in” and they joined the WPIA in 2000. It wasn’t long before David Coffey called to ask if they would be chairs of the membership committee, which they agreed to do. Malcolm and Mary Ann did this job for 10 years. The work was portable, so they could take it with them to Tahoe where they spend 5 months of the year.

Malcolm was born in Seattle, but moved to Greenbrae when he was 16. He went to Drake High, College of Marin and then on to UC Berkeley. He has worked in high tech manufacturing most of his career, but there was hiatus in 1967 when a friend who had just bought a boat, invited him to sail down the coast, stopping in Mexico, through the Panama Canal, to Columbia, and finally to Miami. His trip back to the west coast took him through Denver, Woodside, and finally to Santa Rafael. He lived in Tahoe for 11 years, where he built a house, but returned to the Bay Area. Mary Ann grew up on the peninsula. After graduating from Berkeley, she went to work for Sunset Magazine in advertising. She wanted to move to the city, so she got a job doing sales for the Sir Francis Drake Hotel and later entered a career in investment banking.

When asked how they met, both smiled and told the story of how they had met. Mary Ann had a blind date to go sailing with a friend of Malcolm’s. She eventually married the blind date. She and her husband remained friends with Malcolm. After her divorce, their relationship transitioned into a romance and they were married in 1983. Fortunately they both love cats, so felines have been an important part of their family. They still spend 5 months of the year in their home in Tahoe, with occasional trips up there the rest of the year because Malcolm and Mary Ann are members of the Board of Directors of the North LakeTahoe Historical Society.

When asked about their favorite memories of the Inn, the New Year’s Eve parties, hosted by Olene Sparks, were the first thing they mentioned. For several years, they have been responsible for the breakfast on New Year’s morning (something the regular guests look forward to). They recalled one New Year’s Eve, in particular, when Fred Runner presented a period performance every hour reflecting the history of the Inn. They also enjoy the Chili Cook-Offs, Heritage Nights, and talked about the 100 year celebration in 2004 when Fred Runner arranged for a stage coach to visit the Inn. They value the historic nature of the Inn and the fact that everyone does their share of the work. They believe that the work parties are a great idea to get people used to the idea of pitching in to help. They have never stayed in the Inn itself, but they both said that Cabin 2 (in the old system) is their favorite, with its breath-taking morning views. They also enjoy staying in the Honeymoon Cabin, with its indoor plumbing and cozy fireplace.

BEAUTY AND THE BEAST: California Wildflowers and Climate Change Nita Winter and Rob Badger

The Marin Chapter of the California Native Plant Society (Marin CNPS) will present a special educational, photographic exhibit entitled Beauty and The Beast: California Wildflowers and Climate Change, featuring over 70 wildflower portraits and landscapes by West Point Inn members Nita Winter and Rob Badger. Their beautiful images and text panels address how climate change and other human impacts affect California's wildflowers. Admission is free.

All geographic regions of California are highlighted in this stunning show, from the high alpine "rock gardens" in the Sierra Nevada Mountains to below-sea-level in the Mojave desert's Death Valley National Park. Many of the images featured in Beauty and the Beast are Marin wildflowers that can be seen during hikes to and from the Inn on Marin Municipal Water District and state park land. The artists photographed this Western Azalea (pictured above) on Old Stage Road as they were on their way to join a pancake cleanup crew. Additional sections highlight the power of fire and renewal, a behind-the-scenes look at how the photographers capture these images, and an overview of California's geographic regions.

The exhibit will be on view at the Bay Model Visitor Center lobby (2100 Bridgeway, Sausalito) from April 2 through June 1, 2019, and will be open to the public Tuesdays–Saturdays, 9 – 4pm. Join the artists at the opening reception on Saturday, April 6 from 1–3pm, or meet them on the first two Saturdays and Sundays of May during Marin Open Studios. Note: On Sundays there is access to the lobby only, with no access to the model of the bay.

ALMOND FLOUR COFFEE CAKE (GLUTEN FREE)

Quick and easy this little breakfast cake was enjoyed by the volunteers at the 2nd annual Crab Feed in February. Use either coconut or canola oil.

Combine:

2 ½ cups of almond flour

¼ t salt

½ t baking soda

Mix together and add:

¼ cup canola oil

3 eggs

½ cup honey

Pour batter into a round cake pan

Add topping


½ cup sliced almonds+2 T.cinnamon+1/4 cup sugar+1/4 cup canola oil

Spread evenly over batter

Bake at 350 for 25 minutes
