*PRESIDENT'S REPORT*

Dear West Point Inn Family,

As I start writing this, it is the beautiful Sunday morning that we were all supposed to be meeting at the Inn. I wish I were giving this report in person, but we find ourselves in these bizarre times. Your Board, committee chairs and Innkeepers have been working hard to keep the Inn safe during this health crisis. Also, several discussions have been held on how to reopen once we get the all-clear from state and local governments.

When Marin County initially shut down "non-essential" businesses, way back in mid-March, our Innkeepers and Housekeeping Committee sprang into action. Bonnie Jones and Fran Rondeau zipped up to the Inn and sanitized the kitchen and all the dishes. At the same time, our industrious Innkeepers sealed up the Inn and cabins as best they could. Since then, they have been keeping watch over the Inn so that it remains secure until we can visit it once again.

Although people are supposed to be sheltering-in-place, Mount Tamalpais has been packed with visitors almost every day. Our Innkeepers have had to deal with several incidents of people pushing aside the barricaded furniture on the porch to try and get into our closed restrooms. They are learning several new ways to politely tell people that we are unable to provide access to our facilities, for their safety and ours. We owe a debt of gratitude to Jim Barry, David Durr, Jennifer Greene, Karl Jurgenson, John Slater, Bob Thomson and Pat Williams for their dedication to the Inn. It is not easy staying up there alone for a week at a time, but they are doing an incredible job for us all.

Besides keeping the Inn safe, we are also trying to plan how to reopen once the world returns to "normal." This includes talks on what exactly "normal" will look like. While we will obviously continue to keep the Inn clean to our normal high standards, we will have to decide how our operations will continue. We are having ongoing discussions on topics such as: Will we still be able to have a communal kitchen? Will people have to bring their own blankets and pillows? Will we only be able to operate at 50% occupancy? None of these questions have solid answers yet as the information available to us changes often, sometimes even hour by hour.

One way we are responding is by increasing our ability to clean the dishes. Our Buildings & Grounds committee, led by Ross Asselstine and Urban Carmel, are working on turning the kitchen sink into one with three compartments. That way we will be able to wash, rinse and sanitize like a commercial facility. They are working closely with

Bonnie Jones, our water and sanitation expert. The B&G team is also leading the way, along with the Innkeepers, as we clean and repaint the main kitchen.

Another concern is finances. We have made projections based on different scenarios, including the possibility that we will not take in any more money this year. The shutdown has affected not only our overnight use income but also paused, if not stopped, our pancake breakfast season. We have already canceled the Mother's Day event and we will probably also have to go without Father's Day. These are our two biggest money-makers and the rest of our breakfasts are still in question.

To help with finances our treasurer, Mark Northcross, applied for a Paycheck Protection Program loan through the Small Business Administration. While we were not successful during the first round of funding, we hope to be approved now that Congress authorized a second round. I wanted to be able to announce that we received the money, but it probably will not be until the end of April that we hear if we are approved.

We are also discussing other ways to raise money, but we are always open to hearing suggestions from our members. One idea is to have a "virtual" pancake breakfast, where you can send us photos of you and your quarantine family having pancakes (if you want to include a few dollars, that would be appreciated also . . .). We would then post the photos on the website. Nancy Fox and the PB Committee, Lin Johanson and Gordy MacDermott, are also working on sketching out one of Fred Runner's excellent photos of the Inn so kids can color it in. We would then also display them on the site. If you have another thought, please let them know at [pancakes@westpointinn.com](mailto:pancakes@westpointinn.com).

I want to thank Nancy and the rest of the Board, Bonnie Jones, Don Keeley, Wayne Koide, Pete Martin, Jim Parton, Johanna Sisteck and Clare Wellnitz, for their hard work, advice, and guidance during this period. I especially want to thank Wayne, who is leaving the Board after almost 4.5 years of service. He will continue as the Policy & Procedures Committee chair, but we appreciate Wayne's dedication to the Inn including his year as President. We also want to welcome Alyssa Jorgensen, who will be filling out the rest of Wayne's term. We look forward to Alyssa's ideas and contributions to the Inn. Welcome aboard!

I also want to thank the committee chairs who have continued to work on their projects, albeit from home. Some of them have provided reports, which you can find below. I also want to thank Alison Bricker (newsletter editor), Jan Gauthier (Communications/Website committee chair) and Kay Voyvodich (webmaster) for their hard work during the early days of the shelter-in-place order. Their quick actions have kept you all informed as information changes quickly. Sometimes the news is different even before we could hit "send" on the announcement that was currently being written.

Finally, I want to thank our Membership. Thank you for your patience and understanding during this period. While we will follow science, common sense and local government directives to decide when we reopen, we will get through this. Someday, hopefully soon, we will all be able to meet again up at our beloved Inn.

Hope to see you back on the mountain as soon as it is safe to venture out again to our beloved inn.

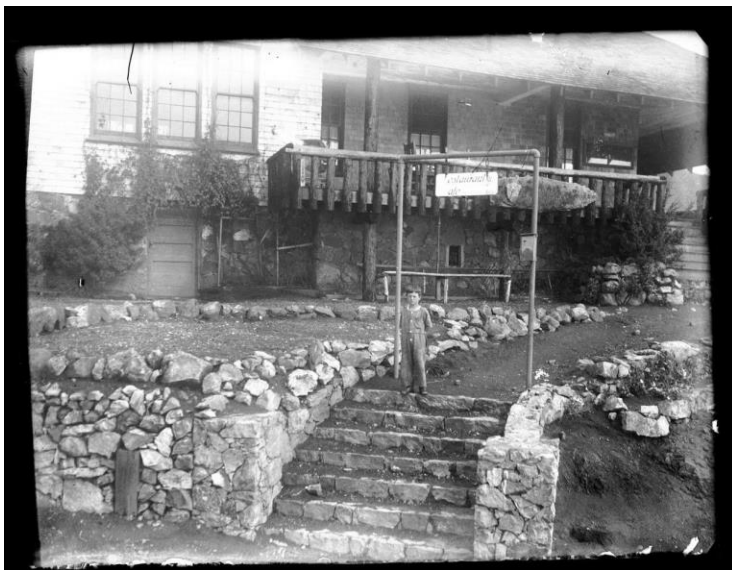

I'm including two photos that would have been part of Heritage Weekend, showing young Ralph Kliewe (Klee-way) on the Inn's stone steps. The view is likely shot from the cab of one of the mountain steam locomotives. Another photo shows the Inn under a blanket of 1922 snow. On the right side of that snow-covered shot is the Mountain Play train passenger boarding platforms on the right. The Mountain Play weekend was the biggest weekend of the year at the Inn. Innkeepers Martin and Melanie Kliewe had to hire extra staff to manage the cooking and cleaning as the Mountain Play actors and director stayed overnight and playgoers came for a big dinner after the single Sunday show.

Of course, I'm also managing the restoration of Mt. Tamalpais & Muir Woods Railway's engine No. 9, the only surviving piece of the railroad that built the West Point Inn.
